Fir Class Fir Class have had a great first two weeks and have settled back into the routines of school beautifully! We have been busy with all our new Topics and are very excited to be learning about pirates. In English, the children have been retelling the story, 'The Pirates of Scurvy Sands.' We have been focusing on sequencing through drama and role play. We have even started to build our own pirate ship! In Maths, we have started our new unit, addition and subtraction within 20. The children have been using the resources in the classroom to help them master new concepts. In RE, we started the term by focusing on the day of Epiphany. We had a very special collective worship in class where the children shared their hopes as we begin the new year. We then wrote prayers expressing gratitude for what we have and to also express our own wishes for 2025.


Happy New Year! We have had an excellent start to 2025 in Fig Class! The children have settled back into school well and it has been lovely to hear about everything they did over the Christmas holidays. In English, we have begun reading our new book, 'The Iron Man' by Ted Hughes. In groups, the children created large paintings of the Iron Man and then were challenged to come up with as many adjectives as they possibly could to describe the Iron Man, I was really impressed with the children's vocabulary! In Maths we have started our unit on money. We have begun adding different amounts together and working out change. In Science, we are looking at plants, we have been exploring the different parts of plants and what they need to grow. The children will be planting their own plants in the coming weeks. In RE, we have been working on our Christmas unit.



In Acorn Class this week we continued for a second week on our topic 'All About Feelings'. The children have really enjoyed sharing their ideas with one another about the different things that make them feel happy or sad. We re-visited our class values, and on the tuft table we made our own bottles of friendship potion, which were filled with equal amounts of kindness, sharing and









What a fantastic start **Bay Class** have had to the new term! The children have been working incredibly hard and showing great enthusiasm for their learning. Here is a quick look at what we have been up to in the past two weeks: We have returned to multiplication and division, tackling larger numbers with confidence. The children have been learning how to multiply 2-, 3-, and 4digit numbers by 2-digit numbers, focusing on carefully lining up place values to keep calculations neat and accurate. We have also begun exploring multiple methods for long division, which has been both challenging and rewarding for the class. Any extra practice at home with these concepts would be hugely beneficial to reinforce their understanding! We have been diving into the exciting world of Percy Jackson: The Lightning Thief. The children have been captivated by the story, which links wonderfully to our topic on the Ancient Greeks. In grammar, we have been focusing on the use of parenthesis—exploring how brackets, dashes, and commas can add extra information to our writing. The students have been eagle-eyed in spotting examples in the text. This week, we have paused the story to allow the children to write their own endings to Percy Jackson. I can't wait to see how their creativity shines through in their narratives—it's always a joy to read their imaginative ideas!

We have had a productive week this week in **Oak Class**, starting our new book 'The Wild Way Home' and exploring the descriptive language used in the first few chapters. Our main character ,Charlie, is dealing with having a sibling for the first time! In Maths, we are continuing our Multiplication & Division unit and linking number facts (e.g. $4 \times 3 = 12$ so $4 \times 30 = 120$ and $40 \times 3 = 120$). In Science, we have been identifying and classifying rocks, which we will be using to investigate rocks that we find in our local environment. In Art, we have been observing rocks and sketching, showing the texture and the shape of the rock accurately.

Ash Class have had a great start to the new term. We have been learning about diary entries and the children will be using a character (Eve) from our class novel 'Diver's Daughter' to write a diary entry from Eve's point of view. The children have been learning which features to include and we have been reading lots of different diary entries to help reinforce the structure and linguistic features of a diary entry. This will guide the children in their writing next week. In Maths we have revisited adding and subtracting 4-digit numbers with exchange. For some this has been challenging however, Ash class have worked hard to improve their understanding of column addition and subtraction. Our Topic this term is the Elizabethan Era, and the children have really embraced this. They are intrigued by this period in history. Their curiosity and eagerness to learn is infectious and brilliant to see. I look forward to sharing the children's progress with you throughout the term. Keep up the magnificent work Year 4!

Willow Class have started the term with great interest and curiosity in our new Topic on Ancient Egypt. In Maths we have been learning about ratio, identifying the ratio symbol and finding the fraction. In English we have started our class book 'Secrets of a Sun King'. The class have enjoyed writing persuasive leaflets on going on holiday to Egypt. In Science we have been looking at the circulatory system, identifying parts that make up the human body and the function of the circulatory system. We have been discussing the meaning of Christmas in RE, comparing the story of the birth of Jesus in the four Gospels. The class are really enjoying learning tennis skills in PE. The children have created some lovely pieces of homework based on the Ancient Egyptian Pharoh Tutankhamun.



The **Chestnuts** have had an exciting and productive start to the new term! We began by reading Lost and Found by Oliver Jeffers, which sparked thoughtful discussions about helping others who may feel lonely, just like the penguin in the story. The children shared wonderful ideas about how to be a good friend. They also loved re-enacting the tale in our South Polethemed role-play area, imagining what it would be like to set sail to the South Pole and deciding what they would pack for the journey - suggestions included a bed, a TV, and even a toilet! We continued our winter topic by exploring ice and snow. The children discovered some of our toys had been frozen and took on exciting challenges to free them. They experimented with different household substances to melt the ice and release the toys, all while

learning through play and investigation. In Phonics, we have been focusing on the sounds th and ch and practising the red words he and she. In Maths, the children have been reinforcing their knowledge of maths by subitising, recognising numbers and exploring ways to make 5 with the help of the nursery rhyme Five Little Speckled Frogs. During RE, the children started learning about baptism and exploring its meaning and significance. In Music, the children have had fun learning to sing and play Wind the Bobbin Up on the glockenspiel. It has been a wonderful start to the term and we are looking forward to more exciting learning adventures!
