The past two weeks have also seen children across the school complete assessments in order to check for gaps in learning and plan for next term. The children have completed them with impressive effort.

In assemblies, we have talked about being a follower of Christ and how we can follow Him in our everyday lives. During classroom Prayer and Liturgy sessions, children have written beautiful prayers. 

The **Chestnuts** have had an incredible two weeks of learning! Last week, they opened their very own dinosaur shop after reading The Dinosaur Department Store by Lily Murray. Inspired by the story Dear Zoo, the children created their own version called Dear Museum. Each child designed a page explaining why they couldn't keep the dinosaur that the museum sent them—although quite a few were eager to keep their dino pets! I was especially impressed with their phonics skills as they segmented words like spiky and mean with confidence. The Chestnuts explored what dinosaurs were, what they looked like, what they ate, and how big they were. They were especially shocked to discover that a Tyrannosaurus Rex would have been bigger than the school! This week, the Chestnuts were thrilled to take part in Drawing Club, based on the book Are the Dinosaurs Dead, Dad? They brainstormed creative ways to stop a T-Rex from eating the main characters, Dad and Dave. Their ideas ranged from putting roller skates on the dinosaur to tying its mouth shut with elastic bands! We also became palaeontologists, digging in our class sandpit and even dissecting coprolites (fossilised poo!) to determine which dinosaur left them behind. By examining the remains inside, we discovered that our dino visitor was a herbivore! In Art, we explored clay and used it to create ammonite fossils, just like the ones we studied from Charmouth Beach. In Maths, we focused on understanding the relationship between numbers up to 8 and practised counting beyond 20. The children also identified repeating patterns in

Willow Class continue to show great enthusiasm in our Topic, exploring how we know about Ancient Egypt using primary and secondary sources. In Maths, we have been finding and solving algebraic equations. The children continue to enjoy our class book 'Secrets of a Sun King', exploring the characters and predicting what happens next. The children have written diary entries based on a character in our class book. In Science, we have been investigating exercise and heart rate and then presented our findings in a graph. We have been learning about the rite of Baptism and Confirmation in RE. The class enjoyed creating Baptism booklets to share with a younger class.

The children have produced lovely models and pages of information on John the Baptist for homework. Have a lovely half term!


We have had a busy couple of weeks in Oak Class. Last week was assessment week and I

wanted to say how proud I was of how all the children tried their hardest and demonstrated all that they have learned. On Wednesday, we had the amazing opportunity to attend a singing workshop at Christ Church Cathedral School and then after practising with some choristers, we went over to the cathedral to practise singing and trying to fill the larger space. This was in preparation for our performance of the songs on 17th March. Whilst there, we even had chance to visit the 'Harry Potter' stairs! We have been continuing our Topic of the Stone Age and this week we are writing instructions. In Maths, we have been finishing off our topic of Multiplication & Division, we have even been dividing numbers with remainders. Our RE topic this half term has been 'We listen to the Word of God'. We completed our topic, learning about the Baptism of Jesus and the significance of the Holy Trinity appearing. They then created some beautiful artwork reflecting this.

What a fantastic term we have had in **Bay Class**. The students have been working incredibly hard across all subjects. In Maths, we have been tackling some very complicated fractions, focusing on finding fractions of a whole. While the concepts have been challenging, the children have shown great perseverance and are really starting to grasp some advanced fraction work. I have been so impressed by their determination and willingness to keep going even when faced with tricky problems. Our Topic this term has been all about ancient Greek mythology, and it has been an absolute joy to teach. I have never seen the children so engaged in a topic before, and it truly

reflects in the quality of work they have made. We are now preparing for our final big write of the term, where students will use everything they have learned from reading and analysing different myths to create their very own myth. I am very much looking forward to reading their myths! Alongside this, they have been busy creating beautiful artwork, including depictions of mythical monsters, Greek pots, and gold coins, all of which have been a wonderful addition to our classroom displays. In RE, we recently had a meaningful collective worship gathering where we discussed how Jesus taught us to be kind. The children shared thoughtful ideas on how they can show kindness through their words and actions, striving to be living examples of Jesus's kindness in their daily lives. It has been a fantastic term, and I am so proud of the effort and enthusiasm the students have shown in all areas of their learning. I hope everyone has a fun and safe break!

Ash **Class** showed great resilience last week when completing their assessments, we are really proud of them all. This week we have spent time exploring the Sacrament of Baptism. We have looked at Jesus' baptism and how many different artists have depicted this event. We then explored our own baptism, and the many signs and symbols found in this sacrament. The children







enjoyed creating their own masterpieces of Jesus' Baptism, they are proudly displayed in class. In Maths, we are looking at the perimeter and area of rectilinear shapes. The children have practised drawing shapes accurately to aid their calculations, making sure they use a sharp pencil and ruler. In English we continue to read and explore the different characters in A Midsummer Night's Dream, as we prepare to create our own playscripts.

Fir Class have had some lovely in class collective worship lessons recently and have enjoyed singing lots of hymns and writing prayers as well. I have been really impressed with the children's enthusiasm and thoughtful participation during collective worship- great work Fir Class! In Topic, the children have worked brilliantly in teams to make some fantastic posters about Grace O'Malley. They used the facts that they found out in their homework task to help them add some good information to their posters. In Maths, we have consolidated addition and subtraction and have done lots of extra practise using a variety of different resources to help us solve word problems. The children's developing knowledge and understanding of number has been a pleasure to see grow!

I am really proud of **Fig Class** for their hard work and determination during assessment week! All the children tried their very best. We have also been busy in Fig Class conducting Science experiments! We planted some plants and have put some in the dark and some in the light. The children have made predictions as to whether the plants in the dark or the plants in the light will grow the best and be the healthiest. The children are watering the plants every day and watching closely for the results. In PE, the children have had lots of fun playing dodgeball! I have seen lots of brilliant teamwork and resilience. I have also been really impressed with how hard the children have been working in RE during our Unit on Miracles and Parables. Well done Fig Class! I hope you all have a lovely half term.

Wow! What a busy term **Acorn Class** have had! We are really proud of our new Acorns, who have settled really well and our existing Acorns who have warmly welcomed them into our class. Last week, after reading the book 'The Train Ride' by June Crebbin we enjoyed all things train. In our train station we travelled to London, Scotland, Italy and so many other places! We made trains using junk modelling, painted pictures using trains and drew our own train tracks and added what we saw from the train, just like in 'The Train Ride'. This week we are reading the book 'Walking through the Jungle' by Julie Lacome. The children have really enjoyed learning about jungle animals and thinking about how they move and sound, as well as going on our walk through the jungle. In Maths we have been learning about length; we have measured ourselves using masking tape and then compared to see who is the longest or shortest. In our RE lessons we have been learning about God's family and what it means to be part of such a wonderful community. We finished the term with a day of love, inspired by the story of St Valentine; making heart biscuits and Valentine cards for our families. Enjoy your half term Acorns and the biscuits!
