Fir Class have been so enthusiastic the last two weeks about our Topic work and have created their own pirate ship which they have been having lots of fun playing in. We have also



used it to help us with parts of our English work, based on the book 'The Pirates of Scurvy Sands.' For homework last week, I set the children a research task to find out two or three facts about Grace O'Malley. The children did so well with this, and we enjoyed sharing some of what we found out together as a class- great work Year 1! Fir Class have also been enjoying their



Science work recently and have started to learn all about the different animal groups and the features that distinguish these animals from

each other. I have been so impressed with how much knowledge they have absorbed so quickly!



In **Acorn Class** this week we have been very busy celebrating Chinese New Year. We did all sorts of activities around the celebrations, including making some wonderful dragon faces and bodies, decorating role play masks and designing our own paper lanterns, which we hung in our Chinese restaurant role play area. In Literacy we read 'The Chinese New Year Story', and then re-told it using props, models and a story tray to help us. We were able to name and count all twelve animals in the story and talk about what they did. In Maths we looked at Chinese numbers 1-10 and have continued with our 1:1 counting.



The past two weeks have been filled with exciting learning experiences in **Chestnut Class**! Last week, we explored the classic tale of *Little Red Riding Hood*, using maps to imagine her journey and discussing local landmarks she might pass. The children then created their own maps, recalling key locations and characters while adding some imaginative places, which they labelled using their phonic knowledge. We also started thinking about healthy eating, discussing which foods are good for us and what healthy snacks Little Red Riding Hood could take to Grandma's house. This week, we have been celebrating Chinese New Year and welcoming the Year of the Snake. The children enjoyed learning the story behind the Chinese zodiac and discovering how this special occasion is celebrated. They had lots of fun creating colourful dragons, ready for an exciting dragon dance with Acorns! In Maths, we have been comparing quantities, focusing on sets of objects without being influenced by colour, shape, or size. The children have been learning to recognise when groups are equal or unequal and how to adjust them to make them the same. We're also reinforcing key language such as *more than*, *fewer than*, and *an equal number*. In Art, the children produced some brilliant charcoal drawings of wolves, showing great creativity and attention to detail. Well done Chestnuts, for another fantastic fortnight of learning!

Fig Class have been working very hard! In English, the children have written some wonderful character descriptions about the Iron Man, using lots of adjectives and similes! As homework the children were challenged to describe their favourite character from a book, film or tv show. I have really enjoyed reading their descriptions of characters such as Bluey, Aladdin and Thomas the Tank Engine! In Topic, the children have been enjoying exploring the life of George Stephenson, we even took a sneak peek inside his house and considered the differences between his house in the 1800s to our homes today. We had a friendly Phonics competition in Fig Class, in teams the children had to write as many words as they possibly could with a certain sound in them. Well done to Team Fabulous who were our winners!





Willow Class has shown great interest in our Topic, learning about when Ancient Egyptian civilisation started and



understanding how we know about the History. In Maths, we have been learning Algebra, solving function machines and forming equations. The class are really enjoying our class book 'Secrets of a Sun King'. The children are predicting what might happen next in the story and continuing the narrative. In Science, we have been learning about the blood vessels in our body and investigating heart rate. We have been comparing the Gospel accounts of the Baptism of Jesus in RE. The class enjoyed having a visit from the injury prevention education programme (IMPs), learning important first aid skills to respond effectively if an incident occurs.



Bay Class has been working incredibly hard during the past two weeks! In English, they have finished their narrative pieces, continuing the story of *Percy* Jackson and the Lightning Thief. Their creative endings were a joy to read. Building on our term topic, we have started exploring a collection of Greek myths, which has sparked some fantastic discussions about their themes and messages. The children have identified common characteristics of myths and will soon be writing their own. In Maths, they have completed their multiplication and division exam successfully and have




now moved on to the second part of our fractions unit. It has been wonderful to see them applying their knowledge with confidence. In PE, we have been focusing on teamwork and problem-solving through our Adventure Education unit and it has been fantastic to watch the children collaborate and think creatively to tackle different challenges.

In Maths we have been really challenging the children and learning how to multiply 2-digits by 2-digits. Lots of the children have been showing amazing determination and resilience in this area of maths. With continued practice they will master this area of calculation. Don't give up year 4! A special mention has to go to Eli who was a mascot for Oxford United at the weekend. We are extremely proud of you Eli and hope to see you playing on the pitch in the future.

The last two weeks in **Oak Class** have been busy! We have been busy learning how to multiply and divide 2-digit numbers with exchanges, using partitioning to help. In English, we have started looking at our new book 'How to wash your woolly mammoth', which will lead us onto writing out our own set of instructions over the next couple of weeks. In our Topic lessons, we have been learning about the Palaeolithic and Mesolithic parts of the Stone Age and how life changed and shifted from nomadic lifestyles to agriculture. We have been focusing on being called by God in RE, we have discovered how people were called by God in the Bible and how we build our relationship with God and reconnect with Him when we go to Mass.






