Willow Class really enjoyed our trip to the botanical gardens this week linked to our Science topic on classification, evolution and adaptation. We were shown around the grounds and told about the different types of plants, then had lunch before heading back to school. In English, the children have been writing lovely stories based on a character with a physical disability. The class thoroughly

enjoyed our visit to the playhouse to watch a performance of The Three Musketeers. In RE, we have been finding out about the role of the Archbishop and the school diocese. The class created lovely pieces of

artwork on St Aloysius, using pencils, pens and chalks. The class enjoyed reading with the Year 1s outside last week. All the children are enthusiastically rehearsing for our end of year play, learning lines, singing songs, making props and scenery.

Fig Class have completed their Maths unit on Statistics with interpreting and drawing pictograms. They found that pictograms can be a very useful tool for a class survey of 'Favourite Flavours of Ice Cream'. The whole school were treated to ice lollies for St Aloysius' Day (one of our hottest days so far this year) and will soon be planning and designing a refreshing fruit salad for the end of term. So far, the class has been choosing from different food groups to draw a picture of a healthy meal. In English they have begun their biography of David Attenborough, who is one of our topic heroes. For PE, Fig Class has been trying out the new school bicycles, helping those who are cycling for the first time.

It has been a full-on week in **Bay Class**, and I just wanted to say how proud I am of the class. We have been working through a series of practice SATs papers, covering everything from grammar and spelling to reading, arithmetic, and reasoning. It is a lot to take in, especially all in one week, but the children have really risen to the challenge. They have stayed focused, supported one another, and given it their best shot every day. It has not gone unnoticed. On top of that, rehearsals for Looking Good, Robin Hood are well underway. Lines are being learnt (and acted with flair!), songs are coming together, and it has been brilliant to see some real personalities shining through on stage. There is a definite buzz starting to build about the performance, and I know the children are eager to show you what they have been working on. Thank you for your support at home, especially with learning lines/lyrics. Have a great weekend!

Ash Class have had a fabulous few weeks! Now that the Multiplication Check is behind us, we have been focusing on revising our understanding of telling the time. Children are more confident with this and their progress has been amazing. Next week, we will be moving on to shapes and angles. In English, we are beginning a poetry unit, drawing on everything we have learnt about the Anglo-Saxons. The children have enjoyed creating mythical legends and inventing imaginative creatures to bring their stories to life. In RE, we have been investigating which country has the most Catholics. Many in our class believed it would be Italy, so they were surprised to discover that it is actually Brazil! We will remain focused on the early Christian church and discovering how the disciples spread the word of God.

Fir Class have been practising using lots of new vocabulary in Maths as we have been learning all about position and direction in Maths. We used our carpet and became human robots as our friends gave us one instruction at a time so we could reach a target on the carpet. We had to listen carefully to instructions and make sure that we did not step on any of the obstacles on our routes! We have also been making Beebots and maps for writing instructions. Some children also decided to hide an object in the

classroom, and using positional language, guided a partner to where it was hidden. I have been so impressed with everyone's Maths skills! In English we wrote questions for Floella from our story and then took turns getting into character and hot seating Floella. We thought carefully about what Floella might say about her life in England compared to Trinidad. Super work!

This week in **Acorn Class** we have been learning about Corpus Christi. The children have had the opportunity to role play being the priests at mass. We have been reflecting with them about what the body and blood of Jesus is, why it is so special and what is happening when the bell sounds in Mass. We have also had a focus on teamwork and making sure that everyone is given the chance to participate in group activities and play. The children have worked hard on some collaborative projects including an amazing piece of art, created in teams painting strips of paper and then weaving them in and out of garden mesh. We have enjoyed team parachute games, giant games of snakes and ladders to practise turn taking and collective building challenges with the blocks inside



In **Oak Class**, we have been preparing to write our newspaper reports on Pompeii. We have been learning about the different parts of a newspaper report and planning our own. In Maths, we have continued our work on time and are feeling more confident working out how much time has passed since an acitivity began. Our topic in RE at the moment is Pentecost, we have been learning about how the Holy Spirit transforms and the gifts that we get from the Holy Spirit when we are baptised. We have been exploring forces in Science and we will continue investigating how friction affects movement. Our Computing project this term has been creating a maze game on Scratch. We have been creating code and debugging it when it goes wrong.

Over the past two weeks, **Chestnut Class** have continued their exciting 'Around the World' topic and what a journey it's been! Last week, we made a stop in the Australian Outback, where the children enjoyed exploring the

wonderful world of Australian animals through the story 'The Koala Who Could'. Using their growing phonic skills, the children worked hard to sequence the story and retell it in their own words. In Art, the children made their own artwork inspired by the style of Australian Aboriginal dot painting. This week, we have swapped the desert for the sea with a pit stop on Treasure Island. It has been a swashbuckling week of pirate-themed fun! The Chestnuts have been busy hunting for treasure, crafting their very own eye patches, designing treasure maps, and building pirate ships which they then tested to see if they would float. There were some very impressive (and seaworthy!) designs. In Drawing Club, our focus has been the story 'The Night Pirates'. The children were challenged to imagine what could be making a mysterious scratching sound from inside a treasure chest. Their imaginations were in full sail, with ideas ranging from crabs playing violins, to bunnies munching on carrots, and even big monkeys trying to escape! In Maths, we have been revisiting our number bonds to five and developing our ability to recall them quickly and confidently. It has been another brilliant two weeks' of learning. We cannot wait to see where our next adventure takes us!


The Peace Garden!


